


## The Humanitarian Review


The Humanitarian Review aimed to answer these questions:

How can UNICEF adapt its model to ensure it can respond to future humanitarian contexts and needs quickly and effectively?

## **Progress and challenges**

#### **Progress**

- 16 recommendations completed, 46 under way
- Revised policies and procedures
- Human resources, leadership and learning
- Programming capability and modality
- Preparedness and anticipatory action

### **Challenges**

- Implementation not progressing on 8 recommendations
- Increase in global complex humanitarian emergencies (competing priorities)
- COVID-19 pandemic
- Financial and human resources constraints

# Moving forward in 2024 and 2025



#### Strategic review

Carry out a mid-term assessment of implementation to date



### **Priority Areas (2024–2025)**

Accelerate implementation of recommendations, especially in the areas of human resources, nexus, localization, accountability to affected populations, and humanitarian advocacy.



#### Heightened collaboration

Enhance internal coordination and collaboration to maximize efforts and impact



#### Resources

Commit required resources to fully implement all recommendations
