Multiple Indicator Cluster Survey 2022: The Situation of Women and Children



The Jamaica Multiple Indicator Cluster Survey (MICS) was carried out in 2022 by the Planning Institute of Jamaica (PIOJ in collaboration with the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), the Inter-American Development Bank (IDB), and the Statistical Institute of Jamaica (STATIN), as part of the Global MICS Programme. Technical support was provided by UNICEF and financial support was provided by both UNICEF and the IDB.

The Global MICS Programme was developed by UNICEF in the 1990s as an international multi-purpose household survey programme to support countries in collecting internationally comparable data on a wide range of indicators on the situation of children and women. MICS surveys measure key indicators that allow countries to generate data for use in policies, programmes, and national development plans, and to monitor progress towards the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and other internationally agreed upon commitments.

The 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development consists of 17 goals with 247 indicators. Among the Sustainable Development Goals (SDG) Indicators, 45 were recognised as child related. The Jamaica MICS 2022 covers about 30 SDG or SDG-related indicators. The commitment under the 2030 Agenda to "leave no one behind", calls for the provision of quality, accessible, timely and reliable disaggregated data.

The objective of this publication is to facilitate the timely dissemination and use of results from the Jamaica MICS by providing a graphical representation of the SDG-related findings of the Jamaica MICS, 2022. These infographics are an accompaniment to the Survey Findings Report, which contains detailed information on the survey methodology and all standard MICS tables.

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
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# End poverty in all its forms everywhere








