Empower communities to detect and respond to child protection issues early



Provide care and protection services to children without parental care



Provide integrated and life-saving child protection services



Coordinate mine action and risk education for children and communities

Counselling and community-based mental health care for children, including in local languages



Capacity building for frontline workers on child protection, confidential reporting of child rights violations, and physical and sexual abuse and exploitation

What do we need?



Grave violations against children, including child recruitment, to be prevented by all parties to the conflict



Access to vulnerable children in armed conflict and disaster areas to provide life-saving child protection services



Community-based reintegration of child victims of grave violations, including children formerly associated with parties to the conflict



Sustainable investment in justice services for children in contact with the law and arbitrarily arrested/detained



Continued expansion of integrated MHPSS services in basic service provision



US\$33.1 million for child protection humanitarian programming
