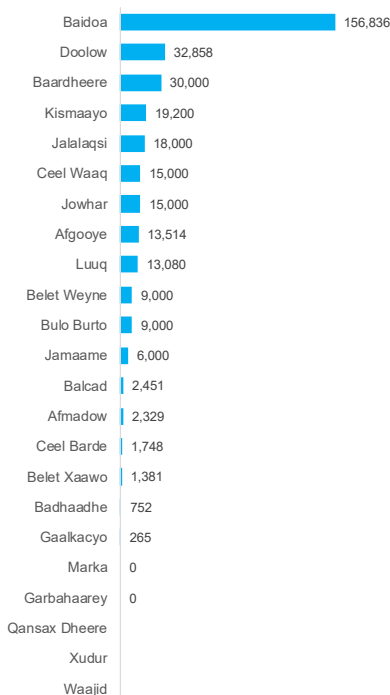

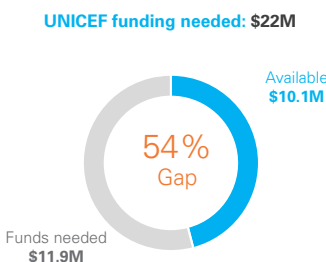

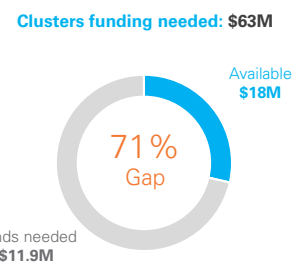
### UNICEF RESPONSE BY DISTRICT



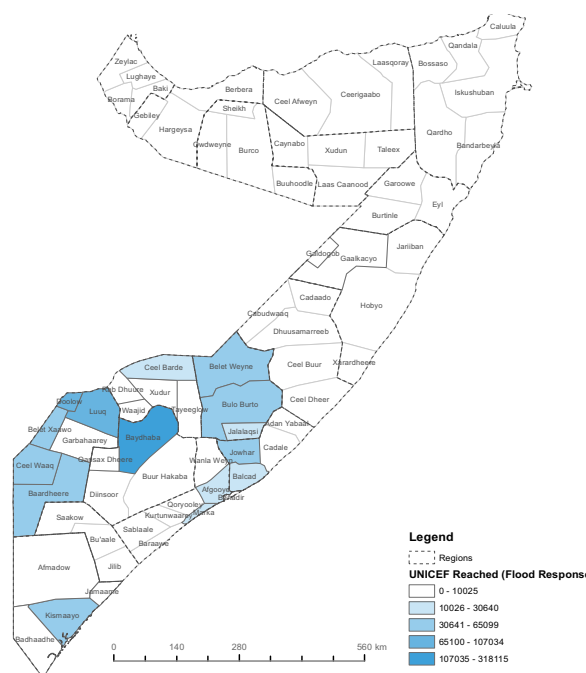
### UNICEF FUNDING GAP

### CHALLENGES AND GAPS

- The affected population is spread widely over 36 districts beyond the current coverage capacity of the UNICEF 9 Rapid Response Teams (RRTs).
- Humanitarian access constraints beyond flood waters are still reported in several sites such as Jalalaqsi limiting RRTs direct engagement with both partners and affected population. In addition to supply movement constraints due to inaccessible airstrips and roads.
- Response monitoring challenges due to partner quality inputs, timely data sharing and frequency.
