

- Zambia has one of the world's highest levels of income inequality and children are disproportionately affected, although important steps were taken in 2022 to address this.
- Product, for example, the social sector budget approved in 2022 for 2023 increased to 9.6 per cent from 8.7 per cent. Moreover, Zambia's Eighth National Development Plan (8NDP) has increased targets for the delivery of social services.
- The expansion of the Social CashTransfer (SCT) programme, which received the biggest increase from **ZMW3.1 billion in 2022 to ZMW3.7 billion** in 2023, is a testimony of this.

## **WHAT WE HAVE ACHIEVED**

## Health & HIV

Through technical support to strengthen the health system, Zambia was able to maintain minimal disruption of service coverage during the COVID-19 pandemic, with less than five per cent decline along the continuum of reproductive, maternal, neonatal, child and adolescent health services in 2022.

### **Vaccination**

Through UNICEF support to the acquisition and delivery of COVID-19 vaccines, cold chain expansion and risk communication and community engagement, Zambia achieved about 80 per cent COVID-19 vaccination coverage among the eligible population of 12 years and above. Moreover, 5.8 million children under the age of 5 years were vaccinated against polio, in response to wild polio virus type-1 (WPV1) outbreak, with UNICEF providing technical and operational coordination, micro planning and monitoring of facility and community-based vaccines delivery.



## **Nutrition**

- Through the Scaling Up Nutrition Programme Phase II, UNICEF supported improved access to VITAMIN A SUPPLEMENTATION for 3,310,224 children aged 6–59 months.
- **201,800** people benefitted from HYGIENE PROMOTION.

- 81,362 households gained access to BASIC SANITATION SERVICES.
- 90,781 households with children under the age of 5 were reached with maternal, adolescent, infant and young child NUTRITION COUNSELLING AND PROMOTION including lessons on improving children's dietary diversity.



Early identification of children with acute malnutrition was enabled, with **490,674** children screened through the INTEGRATED MANAGEMENT OF ACUTE MALNUTRITION PROGRAMME.

## Water, Sanitation & Hygiene

- An estimated **236,000** people gained **ACCESS TO BASIC DRINKING WATER SOURCE**through small-piped water schemes and borehole drilling.
- 6,000,000 people continued to have access to safely managed water through WATER CHEMICAL TREATMENT distribution to commercial utilities.
- Over 470,000 people gained ACCESS TO BASIC SANITATION facilities including access to household toilets/latrines with handwashing facilities.
- 615 villages out of the targeted 1,000 certified OPEN DEFECATION FREE.

- 113 schools and early childhood learning centres, with **59,892** (31,474 girls and 28,418 boys) learners, benefited from **IMPROVED WASH SERVICES.**
- → 36 healthcare facilities reaching a total population of **43,765** (23,514 females and 20,216 males) benefited from **IMPROVED WASH SERVICES.**

## **⇔** Education

- Approximately **20,000** caregivers reached with counseling in **INTEGRATED EARLY CHILDHOOD DEVELOPMENT (ECD)** [responsive care, health, nutrition, and water, sanitation, and hygiene] administered through home visits, group **COUNSELING SESSIONS** in community settings, including at Insakas and health centres.
- **7,737** children aged 0–3 years reached with **INTEGRATED ECD**.
- 3,229 children aged 3–8 years reached through PLAY-BASED LEARNING opportunities at the Insaka early childhood education classroom and accompanying playground.
- CONSTRUCTION OF 12
  INSAKAS, supported along
  with drilling of 12 boreholes
  and provision of ECD services
  across 26 community sites
  and at several surrounding
  health facilities.

- Over **2,300** radio/audio materials developed for ECE and Grade 7 learners; about 500 interactive e-learning contents developed for children with disabilities, and a teaching and learning platform called 'THE LEARNING PASSPORT' launched to make learning accessible to all.
- FLAGSHIP CATCH-UP PROGRAMME implemented in Luapula one of Zambia's most underserved provinces reaching **42,861** learners (21,642 females and 21,219 males) and 260 schools. At midline, 44 per cent of learners could read at least a simple paragraph compared to 31 per cent at baseline while 62 per cent of the learners were able to perform addition at midline compared to 39 per cent at baseline.

## **†** Child Protection

UNICEF provided continued support to STRENGTHENING THE REGULATORY FRAMEWORK

for the protection of children, as evidenced by Zambia's adoption of the Children's Code Act, the Social Worker's Act, the Anti-Human Trafficking Act and policies on migration, trafficking/smuggling, volunteerism, and civil registration.

PROTECTION SERVICES (including community case management, psycho-social support, alternative care and protection of child victim/witnesses in judicial processes) and behaviour-change engagement which focused on ENDING CHILD MARRIAGE AND PREVENTING UNWANTED TEEN PREGNANCY through gender transformative dialogues and local radio broadcasts.

THE INTEGRATED CIVIL REGISTRATION AND VITAL STATISTICS SYSTEM was rolled out to 40 of the 116 districts, leading to a total of 152,162 (76,543 male and 75,619 female) births being notified and 84,349 children (42,691 male and 41,658 female) being registered representing, a 70 per cent increase in birth registration compared to 2021.

PREVENTION OF SEXUAL EXPLOITATION AND ABUSE

was mainstreamed across all programmatic areas reaching **737,446** community beneficiaries (365,036 males and 372,410 females) with messaging and access to safe reporting channels.



## **Social Protection**

THE GOVERNMENT'S SOCIAL CASHTRANSFER PROGRAMME.

with support from donors and UN agencies including UNICEF, covered **5,061,280** people (approximately 51 per cent of the country's poor population). Transfer values increased from ZMW150/300 to ZMW200/400 a month for households without or with a member with severe disability, respectively.

To **EXPAND COVERAGE** to pregnant and breastfeeding women and infants, the Government, with UNICEF support, commenced a new flagship pilot in four districts, enrolling **12,913** households for additional SCT payments.

OF THE SNDP, approved and launched
by the Government in 2022. UNICEF also
supported analysis and evidence around

## Advocacy for Children's Rights

UNICEF helped amplify children's voices for child rights in Zambia.
With our support, on WORLD
CHILDREN'S DAY, the Government of the Republic of Zambia hosted a multi-country event with the Presidents of Botswana, Zambia and Zimbabwe, the Vice-President of Namibia and 500 children. The commemoration served as an opportunity to celebrate the ADOPTION OF THE CHILDREN'S CODE ACT and reflect on the situation children's face while assessing progress made in the learning crisis,

their **VOICES AND OPINIONS**WERE HEARD on issues affecting
their lives.

Key high-profile individuals were engaged to support ADVOCACY AROUND CHILD RIGHTS, including the President, the Vice-President and different ministers and media personalities.





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
